Dear Friends in Christ,

Amazing! Sacrificial! Loving! Transformational! These are words at the center of our faith and our shred life. They are aspirational, beautiful, and meaningful. They also fully apply to the attitude, approach and accomplishments of a group of people who have been tirelessly working on a critical process within our church. The group is the Personnel Committee (Carl Bradford, Hal Brink, Joan Kopperl, Jeremy Ridenour and Chaired by Madonna Meagher)

After being charged by Council six months ago to fulfill the by-laws of our church is supporting our staff and congregation through personnel feedback and evaluation, they have been meeting, often weekly, to revise and develop instruments, to seek input, and to carefully and openly discuss the gathered information. As you receive this newsletter, they have completed writing their reviews and begun meeting with our staff. This is a critically important aspect of ensuring that our staff are getting both the challenge and support they need to bring vitality to our church.

This will be the first chance I have had to formally receive feedback since I arrived nearly seven years ago. Smart Church Management reports that we are not unique – some 40% of church employees **never** receive evaluations. This process not only will provide our staff with information about the way they do their work, the Personnel Committee has also intentionally incorporated questions about the overall health and vitality of the administration, worship, music, service, fellowship, and educational programming of our church. Thanks to their hard work we will be in a much better position and place to continue following the call of God in our life

together and answering our mission to be God's love in the world.

I thank the congregation too for their active input. Hundreds of feedback forms were received and read. Multiple conversations took place where both individuals and groups shared their thoughts and experiences. The Personnel Committee asked for your engagement – and you responded. Shortly our staff will have received feedback, goals will be set, and our Church Council will have received a snapshot of how the congregation sees our church at this moment.

I am grateful and yet also hopeful that this is not an ending but a beginning. We need you to continue to offer feedback - both joy for things well done and suggestions for how we might do things better. We have systems in place to receive feedback and to help our staff. Both Cathy and I have groups who function as confidential sounding boards. They are groups selected by Council and us to be safe places for dialogue and planning. My group consists of Miles Wheat, Margaret Hornick, Diane Piraino, and Ron Hanft. Cathy's is still being formed but, in the meantime, you can contact David Anderegg. You can give me feedback about any staff member. The Trustees (Chair Joe Nicolosi) are a great place to share feedback on Will in his role as Sexton. The Board of Music (Chair Jack Brown) welcomes comments on our Music while the Deacons (Chairs Cathy Clark and Elizabeth Young) are here to listen to your experiences about worship. If something is important, please let us know. Thank you for the way you participate in the life of our church and the deep ways you care about our mission.

## **Board of Christian Education**

#### **Personnel Committee**

In the July monthly newsletter, I described the workings of all the review templates that the committee is creating and to whom they are being focused: the positions of Pastor, the Minister of Music and the Church Administrator. There has been a big push to get as many feedback forms returned so that everyone who attends our church, member or non-member, can give confidential, honest feedback about how we are doing as a church, and how the church employees are helping us sustain a vibrant, growing church.

I'll admit, I've pushed and nudged all of you to fill out the surveys. I'm pleased to report that over 60 questionnaires were returned for the Minister of Music position, nearly 80 have been returned for the Pastor review, and at least 30 were returned for the Church Administrator position. That smaller number is a good response since the Church Administrator is in his first year plus many of us are still getting to know him and all the tasks he does in the office.

The more feedback forms that are returned, the stronger the data we have to clearly marvel in our strengths as a church and the more "atta'-girl/atta'-boy" kudos for jobs well done. They also help to identify the areas where we can grow as a church, to reflect about our roles as congregants, and to identify what each of us can do to make our community of faith stronger.

I want to take a moment to give a HUGE shout out to the hard working members of this Personnel Committee: Jeremy Ridenour, Carl Bradford, Joan Kopperl, Hal Brink and of course our indefatigable Pastor Brent. We were meeting every two weeks during the months of February-May but as more surveys were returned and we had more data to sort through, we now meet almost every week. It's hard work, but amazing work. How often do any of us get to serve on a committee that can have lasting effects?

We needed each and every one of you to "lift up your voice" and tell us what you think. A majority of you have. And if you would still like to, we're all ears—email us, snail mail us, phone us, or put a note in the lock box in the JE Room. Please be part of this important work.

And finally, as a sales pitch, there is a spot open for another member to join our team shortly after these three employee reviews are finalized. There is more work to do and it's not boring, it's uplifting. As the Life cereal ad on TV once stated, "Try it you'll like it."

The personnel committee is comprised of a member of most of the boards of the church and two "atlarge" church members and the Pastor is ex-officio. They are the "reviewers" of the paid staff at the church which includes Pastor, Music Minister, Church Administrator, Financial Secretary, and Nursery Attendant. This committee is sort of a HR department, and all information is confidential. Our job is also to make recommendations to the Church Council, not to make any decisions about an employee of the church.

#### **Board of Deacons**

The Board of Deacons often discusses choices. For example, this summer we have an option for children to leave the service before the sermon to do a craft and return during the offering, or to stay in the sanctuary. Sounds simple, right?

But choices bring complications. They require decisions: who will lead the craft session? Who will leave the sanctuary and who will stay any particular Sunday—a potential negotiation on the part of parents and children!

Decisions highlight different needs: for example, the church's need to expand the cohort of adults working with the children; a child's need to practice separating from a parent, or sitting quietly through a sermon, or relating to other kids; a person's need to listen to a sermon or cultivate a child's interest in sermon or craft—many, many implications of seemingly simple decisions, with different benefits.

For some people, an active child in the sanctuary during the sermon might be a distraction; for others, a child in the sanctuary might signify the early cultivation of religious interests. The implications of the decisions bring different perspectives into play, and while there may be tension between distraction and learning to focus, the presence of both can in fact be enriching.

Yes, choices are usually enriching, even while they complicate situations and challenge us. Choices help us grow—as individuals and as a church. When there is choice, we learn about other people's perspectives: perhaps a discussion over Sunday dinner about learning to be still and know God, or an account of how to make a "God's Eye" out of yarn and sticks.

Choices also tend to increase participation. I may yet lead a craft for the children (those God's Eyes I loved as a child, perhaps?), and thereby become involved in Sunday school. I also notice that the number of families with children at our church far exceeds the number of families with children at other churches I have attended, perhaps because our options for children are varied, inclusive, and stimulating.

Increased participation leads to connection, and connection leads to intimacy: as a church we come

closer when we all attend to the needs of each other. Today after church, when I went over to say hi to Tommy Wheat, he got out of his chair and put his arms around my leg. Needless to say, my eyes filled with tears of joy.

Increased connection and intimacy lead to a strong sense of community, which allows us to experience the body of Christ: the warmth of fellowship, the hope of security, and the inspiration to relate to the world with love.

Choices require energy: planning, implementation, assessment, and more planning in the form of adjustment. Choices are ongoing, creative situations. As we experience choices in our spiritual life, from the small (which craft?) to the large (how to respond with love to the global changes that strike our hearts?), let's keep our eyes on the potential for growth and community, as we choose to participate and connect with each other.



## A fourteen week study beginning the week of September 9 and wrapping up mid December


We chose this particular study because, in Advent, the lectionary will switch over to providing Sunday readings primarily from Matthew. This will give us the chance to learn more about the Gospel and to prepare for the coming year. This study, led by Pastor Brent, should work for people of all abilities and backgrounds, so feel free to sign up! A description from the publisher:

With all we have to unite us, we still find ways to create division. It is an age-old question: do we focus on what sets us apart, or what holds us together? According to Matthew, it is Emmanuel, God with us. The First Evangelist and the new Christian community saw themselves first as part of Judaism, not separate from it. A distinguishing feature of the Gospel according to Matthew is its use of the Greek term ekklesia, which means an assembly of ones who are called out. It conveys nothing of the static conception of the word "church" held by many today. According to Matthew, the Church is an earthly manifestation of the kingdom of God, and it is comprised of Jesus' followers who have been called out to live righteously in the world and to serve in the manner of the Christ with deep humility and unfathomable forgiveness. In Jesus, there is a new community at work for the blessing of the world. What is it that binds us together? Jesus—God With Us.

### We Want Your News for the Newsletter



On June 30, the church held its annual Strawberry Social.




