

Dear Friends,

News From Around the Church

From the Organ Bench: Singing and the Pandemic

For Christians, singing together in corporate worship is about more than entertainment or even tradition. Christians are commanded to sing together, offering their praises unto God, when they gather for worship (Psalm 68:4-5, Col. 3:16). And throughout their long history, the people of God have been a singing people.

"Restrictions related to singing and other voice performance due to COVID-19 have had enormous professional, financial, and emotional consequences. Unfortunately concern over uncertain future has led to a plethora of unsupported opinions and publications. While most people and organizations probably have tried to gather as much evidence and other information before establishing policies, the urgency and emotional impact of decisions about singing and other performance and face to face contact is stressful. Everyone is under so much pressure to act that is easy for us to act prematurely and especially to forget to explain our reasoning. If people see restrictions as having been arbitrary, or at least as not grounded in credible justification, then they might be more likely to ignore them and make pandemic more likely worse. Almost every day, we hear about groups that have ignored precasuins, that have led to high number of COVID-19 infections among participants.

In an effort to provide clarity and guidance, a group of 18 authors (laryngologists, speech-language pathologists, singers, singing teachers, choir conductors, a basic scientists, and others) collaborated to write 'Safer Singing During the SAR-CoV-2 Pandemic: What We Know and What We Don't.'" Go to *Journal of Voice* at jvoice.org. jvoice.org/article/S0892-1997(20)30245-9/fulltext.

This article summarizes science and myth and suggests areas for research that need to be explored soon. It also provides suggestions on ways to return to singing safely, and it separates evidence from opinion clearly, trying to offer best of both. Eleven specific suggestions are provided to guide return to singing with as much safety as possible." From The American Guild of Organists, with permission from *The Voice Foundation*.

Board of Deacons

As is common in crisis, the Pandemic is a time of stories. We each have ones about ourselves: I lost my glasses at Price Chopper the first time I went shopping in a mask and have been "blind" and disoriented ever since. We have cultural ones: Yard signs appearing in Anthony Fauci's neighborhood which declare "Thank you, Dr. Fauci!" Prince Harry and Meghan Markle delivering food in Los Angeles. A 102-yearo-old great-grandmother recovering from COVID.

Stories help us explain things, to ourselves and each other. They also serve as guides for the future: sometimes **how not to be**: Don't put your glasses on your head when loading groceries in your car. And sometimes **how to be**: Support essential workers. Be generous with your time and energy. Have hope.

Stories typically help us identify with other people, whether fictional, historical, or real characters in our lives. The Bible, of course, is full of stories to help us and guide us through all kinds of crises, and I read an illustrated children's bible when I want easily accessible stories of tribulation and faith. An illustration of the story of young Isaac carrying wood for the sacrifice of his own self while Abraham follows him with agonized fear helps me identify with both son and father—and with the (absent) mother. What if I were Isaac? What if I were Abraham? What if I were Sarah? The different challenges posed to my faith in God resonate in our current crisis as they have through the centuries.

Quinn Caldwell's sermons earlier this summer highlighted a focus on stories, in part in his vivid preaching style, but also by his different dramatic settings, both actual (the exit from the cellar) and narrative (the trans woman being thrown into a paddy wagon outside Stonewall). As I watched the sermons, I entered in: If I were Noah, would I have been able ever to get off the boat, to face the enormity of rebuilding a life and community? Would I ever have heard God again? More challenges, and more reminders of how other people and cultures have endured life-threatening crises, sustained their faith in God, followed Jesus, allowed the Holy Spirit in. some great stories, some of them implicit, some explicit. Sarah Conly and I shared the story of Jesus, and then dearly human Peter, walking on water. Sandor's rousing jazz rendition of "When the Saints Go Marching In" with its foot-stomping, handclapping rhythms took us all to New Orleans—a setting evoking a long history of renewals. Even the noisy motorcycles coming repeatedly around the bend on Route 102 conjured stories of individuals-incommunity for some of us.

The first Evening Worship service on August 16 overtly invited us to share our stories in the weeks and months to come. Brent led the way by telling his story of being called to the Ministry on a street in Moscow. There are opportunities for you to tell a personal story—or sing a song or read a poem--that has served to guide you in challenging times in your life. The Deacons hope that you might share a faith story with your church family. If you might, please let Brent or a deacon know so that we can hear God still speaking in you.

Growth & Fellowship

The pandemic has created all kinds of new: who, before March, knew what "PPE" stands for? Who knew the ins and outs of face masks? We are adaptable, thank God, and we have to be in these difficult times. So...here's another one: THE ZOOM COFFEE HOUR! The Growth and Fellowship Board has been hosting coffee hours in a Zoom format after live streamed church services on Sunday morning. Stick around after church and talk to your neighbors and friends, or, better yet, meet people you have never met! We now have attendees from many different states and a few other countries, so we hope they will come and meet us as well.

We will keep the groups small: if there are a lot of coffee hour Zoomers, we will use "breakout room" technology to keep the groups to a manageable size. And we invite everyone to stay as long, or as short, as you please. In old-fashioned in-person coffee hours, you remember how some people stayed for five minutes and some people stayed until the last plate was cleared away? Same thing here: if you can only stay a little while, come anyway. We would love to see you. If you wish to exit, just say the magic words: "Gotta go!" Art Gallery News


Our church art shows continue as we head into autumn with limited access to the church building, due to the coronavirus.

Membership: A Relationship of Commitment and Covenant

Our family has been growing in different ways. Many have been joining in for worship, morning prayer, small groups, Open Table, and other connection points. Even now in the midst of changing ways, the idea of covenant remains central to our identity. Covenant is a form of holy promise making that joins us together to live into our calling to be a family of purpose.

Here at the First Congregational Church that is how we understand membership – a relationship of commitment and covenant. If you have been connecting with us for a while now and are thinking about calling it home and us family, we invite you to consider becoming a member.

Part of the process includes a conversation about what membership is and isn't; about how this church fits into the larger UCC; about our history, this moment, and our future; and the joys and responsibilities of joining in. Old Tradition in New Ways

A recent study by Harvard University involving thousands of churches across the country identified that Bible Study, more than any other activity, contributes to both an individual's and the community's sense of faith, connection, and purpose. This Fall, we are pleased to invite you into a tradition unfolding in a new way. Every three years we offer extended studies of the Bible and every three years dozens of people step forward to learn, grow and connect.

This year we will offer two different studies both done in new ways that foster connection to God,

scripture, and each other. Both studies work on a theme basis. Both will be done through a combination of recording teaching sessions and small group discussion groups. The idea behind this is to allow people to do the learning and contemplating on their own schedule while connecting people in smaller more intimate groups for conversation,

discussion, learning, and application. Pastor Brent will organize and lead the teaching sessions and join the small groups regularly to check-in and help where needed.

One track will use the Disciple program. This study goes from cover to cover of the Bible in the order the texts appear. While you will not read every chapter and verse, the study will expose you to a great deal of the material. Daily readings should take about 20-30 minutes and there are questions for you to ponder along the way. While we will be concerned about content, just as importantly we will be exploring ways of reading the Bible. The Bible is comprised of many different styles of writing and we will make sure you are equipped to approach these sacred texts with tools to help your understanding. This study is ideal for those new to the Bible and those wanting to return to its beauty in a wholistic way.



The second track will focus on the concept of Covenant, a central part of how we understand our faith journey in the UCC. Through three broad themes of Creating, Trusting, and Living this study works its way throughout scripture looking at how holy promise is not just a central theme but a practice of our faith. Similar time commitment to the Disciples track will be required.

In both cases, we will focus on not just learning the Bible but engaging in dialogue about how it matters for our lives today. They will equip you to be more comfortable talking about the Bible and understanding its full sweep even as they help you to bring those texts into the story of your own life.

> The studies will begin in September and run through the end of May. We anticipate taking breaks that make sense with the calendar. There is the expectation that those who choose to participate will commit to the length of the study. Obviously, if that becomes impossible or burdensome, we will not hold you to it, but we hope you are prepared to make that commitment.

Please take some time to think about this and whether it is right for you. If you have any questions, reach out to

Pastor Brent. If you want to speak with one of the more than 50 members of our congregation who have been part of an extended study, call the office and we will put you in touch. This can be so transformative for each participant and our whole church family. Come and see.


