Rikke Borge lives happily with her daughter, granddaughter, three horses, two ponies, two dogs, three cats, eleven chickens and one Guinea hen. It's been 47 years of Berkshire bliss and it ain't gonna change any time soon. Rikke gleefully accepts acting jobs when offered, and is thrilled to once again appear on the incomparable Lake Mahkeenac Radio Theater. Yep, she's a lucky gal!

A gut-level honesty connects **JoAnne Redding** with her audiences. She has lit up stages from New Orleans to New England, sharing the bill with major acts including The Mavericks, Asleep at the Wheel, and Hank Williams Jr. She has showcased at the Falcon Ridge Folk Festival, selected from over 400 applicants. Her *How It Is* CD spent three months in the Top Ten of *Roots Music Report*'s Blues Chart. Redding's first CD, *Run With It*, recorded in Nashville, and her follow-up albums, *The Running Kind* and *How It Is* have been played on more than 250 radio stations worldwide. In recent years, from sultry to swinging, JoAnne has enjoyed singing jazz and blues, mixing it up from time to time as the mood beckons. She looks forward to her return to Lake Mahkeenac!

Erin Kathleen Casey's voice has been called "consistent, well-balanced, and beautiful..." (Michael Miller, *The Berkshire Review for the Arts*). She is a frequent soloist with the Williams Chamber Players and The Greylock Opera Collective of New England, most recently in the titular role of the world premiere of *The Weeping Woman* by Michael Dilthey. She made her Berkshire Symphony debut in 2019 with Barber's "Knoxville: Summer of 1915," along with her debut at Ozawa Hall in Schubert's Mass in G. She received First Prize in the Aspen Music Festival's Vocal Concerto Competition and was the recipient of the Francesco and Hilda Riggio Award in the New England Regional Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. She is currently the co-director of the Williams Opera Workshop. This past summer she was invited to direct a production *of La Boheme* with the Mediterranean Opera Studio and Festival in Caltiagirone, Sicily, and this summer she looks forward to teaching voice at the Winter Harbor Music Festival in Maine.

Nellie Rustick is a young dramatic soprano whose voice has been praised as "exquisite" and "simply delicious". Recently, she has been seen in Brattleboro Vermont, singing the role of Wellgunde in Wagner's Das Rheingold, covering the role of Sieglinde in Die Walküre, and working as an actor in HBO's The Guilded Age. Ms. Rustick has sung with Tundi Productions, Connecticut Lyric Opera, City Chamber Opera, Capitol Opera Albany, Mosaic - Arts Opera, Hubbard Hall Opera Theater, and Berkshire Opera Festival. As a passionate recitalist, Ms. Rustick has given recitals throughout New York and New England. Favorite performances include Wagner's Wesendonck Lieder and Barber's Knoxville: Summer of 1915 (in recital), The Mother in Amahl and the Night Visitors, the role of Roseofsharon in The Grapes of Wrath, and being a soloist for the 50th Anniversary of Berkshire Lyric Chorus at Tanglewood's Ozawa Hall.

David Anderegg is a psychologist, fiction writer and composer. For several years, he wrote a novel in monthly installments entitled *Aux Pioneers*, published in *Berkshire HomeStyle* magazine. He has published poetry and short stories in *The Berkshire Review* and in *upstreet*; his short story "Heretics" was nominated for the Pushcart Prize by *upstreet* magazine in 2006. He also wrote the libretto and music for two chamber operas, *What Owls Do* and *The Beasts*. He has written pop songs in a wide variety of styles for his a cappella group Quintessential, as well as hymns, art songs, choral anthems and tons of Christmas carols. His most recent work is "Songs from a bad year" for soprano and piano, written during the recent pandemic.

Tracy Wilson served as Executive Director of the Berkshire Music School and retired in 2020 after 17 years. She earned a Masters of Music and Arts Administration degree from the University of Nebraska, with additional studies at Catholic University in Washington D.C. and the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. She is an active musician as a collaborative pianist, conductor of the Stockbridge Festival Chorus and Music Director of the Stockbridge Sinfonia since 2018. Tracy has also being actively involved with the First Congregational Church's music program, frequently serving as its Minister of Music or being ready to serve when needed.
