

The unknown editor of Lyra Davidica wanted music with more movement and spirit than found in the grave, slow-paced psalm unes, with one note to a syllable. Easter Hymn was among the first of a new popular style.

ACTS - Catching Up with the Spirit


A Six Week Small Group Exploration

Beginning the Week of May 1

The "Book of Acts" in the Bible is a continuation of the Gospel of Luke, written by the same author. It recalls how the followers of Jesus lived into what they learned from his life, teachings, ministry, death, and resurrection. It is a story of radical transformation lived out by people who were inspired. Rather than complex theology, Acts far more often leans on simple truths, like shared meals, prayers, resources, and lives. It remembers the coming of the Holy Spirit and how that enabled people to live in ways true, deep, connected, and beautiful.

In this program we will both look at how the people of that time lived and how we might live today. Rather than trying to find a single answer to life, we will look closely for the questions this great text uncovers. We will ask ourselves those same questions as we try to find our own way, meaning, and purpose for our own times.

Whether you are a Bible novice or expert - whether you are a member of this church, another church, or no church - whether you are riding high or weighed down by life you are welcome at this study.
