

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## May 2023 Newsletter

#### Dear Church Family,

Christ is Risen! What a joy Easter was this year. From the blast of brass to the shower of colors; from calls to worship led wholeheartedly by young ones to a scrumptious brunch served by culinary ones; from the chill of the morning air to the

warmth of love everywhere; from the search for colorful eggs to our collective search for answers and questions; and from the choir making a joyful and beautiful noise to our own prayers and confessions lifted in



truth and hope it was a day to remember.

We stand on the cusp of a new beginning and even a new life; there is no better time than now. Because for the next eight weeks, we will be in the longest season of the liturgical year - Easter. Biblically the Easter Season features a treasure of the Bible we often forget about – the Book of Acts. It is the story of what the early followers of Jesus did in the wake of his birth, life, ministry, death, resurrection, and ascension. It is a dynamic story of change and possibility. It includes the coming of the Holy Spirit - that same Spirit that can lead to our own change and to finding the possibilities that are before us.

On Easter Sunday there was a palpable energy in this place. My prayer is that it is an Easter energy – one of emergence rather than return. Jesus' resurrection did not launch that earlier movement to return to what had been. The disciples and Jesus did not plan a reunion tour to visit all the places they had been together. Instead, it was a catalyst to propel those same disciples to live into the way Christ had shown them, to bear witness to his ministry, and to become something new, living, and alive. I pray that the same might be true for us today, and I invite you to join me as we try to follow in their footsteps.

This Easter Season we will offer a small group

study on the Book of Acts – it will be a fantastic way to remember the early followers and not just what they did but how. Central to their discernment of a new path was how they forged community – by gathering, eating, praying, and sharing. Our world, our times, and our challenges are different, but I believe that those three things can be the catalyst for our own times as we emerge from the pandemic into a new

way of being church and as we look at our own world, times, and challenges humbly, courageously, and faithfully.

One invitation I extend to you is the chance to gather like they did – for a meal and for some prayer. On the second Wednesday of each month, a community supper will be served in the J.E. Room. All are invited to come and simply receive the meal as a gift and a chance for fellowship. While those who genuinely want to help or contribute, can – this project is not about more doing, rather it is about being together, eating together, sharing our lives, and finding joy. More information about these suppers can be found on page \_\_\_\_\_ of this newsletter.

For now, keep reveling in the Easter Spirit – keep finding joy and looking for important questions. Keep remembering what Alleluia looks like and remember that Christ is risen. For now, mark your calendars for May 10th to come and eat together. Blessings to you as we live into the transformative change that Easter is.

#### **Pews Get Some TLC**

After much discussion, the Trustees chose Artech of Woodbury, CT to repaint the pews and windowsills. The arrival of the crew was sooner than expected, as we saved \$4,000 by fitting into their schedule. They will work 12-hour days, Monday-Friday, finishing May 5.

There will be a memorial service and worship service in the sanctuary the weekend of April 29-30, as scheduled.

## **Cathedral of the Beloved**

The Rev. Jenny Gregg will preach about this ministry on Sunday, April 30. It is an ecumenical ministry that holds a worship service and offers a free meal each Sunday afternoon in downtown Pittsfield. This ministry serves the marginalized, isolated, and homeless. It seeks to meet people where they are on the street, and to share God's love by being part of the community.

The meals serve 40-50 people, providing a total of 75-80 meals to include take-away. Churches volunteer to cook and serve a meal. In addition to their meal program, they offer a "Laundry Love" program where participants can do their laundry for free at a local laundromat.

Our congregation is signed up for two meals: July 23 and September 24. Volunteer to help shop, cook and/or serve! There is a sign-up sheet in the JE Room.

As Jesus said in Matthew, chapter 25: "I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me. Just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

### News from Mission & Action

#### Survey Results: Housing is #1 Priority

A survey requesting our congregation's input for Mission & Action 2023 priorities produced 35 votes for housing, the highest category. The following article by John Bissell, President and CEO, is taken from the Greylock Federal Credit Union quarterly April newsletter, "Money Talks." It addresses the lack of quality housing in our region and describes a coalition forming in Berkshire County to build momentum toward developing more choices for renters and buyers at every price point. Here is the article:

"Housing the Berkshires: A Coalition of Change" formally launched in January 2023, led by Berkshire Housing and inspired by a study called "A Housing Vision for the Berkshires," published by 1Berkshire and the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission (available at 1Berkshire.com). The Coalition has initially convened more than 120 community leaders to review housing data including:

- Over 50% of all renter households are burdened by the cost of housing in our population centers;
- Local housing stock is older than similar housing stock across Massachusetts;
- The Berkshires have seen minimal new housing construction over the past decade.

As summarized in the "Housing Vision" report, "many residents find it extremely difficult to find affordable, safe and decent housing. This negatively impacts their health and ability to lead stable and productive lives." The Coalition is working to identify potential strategies to address these challenges.

The Coalition's primary vision for housing is for the Berkshires to have "an adequate supply of quality housing to meet the diverse needs of its population." The Coalition includes housing experts as well as partners who are not traditionally involved in housing matters.

It is time for all of us to get involved in finding solutions to our housing crisis. Please visit berkshirehousing.com to learn more, and to think about how you can make an impact. You can encourage friends and co-workers to attend the next Coalition meeting; share the vision report with your landlord; volunteer on a community board or commission; raise your supportive voice at local hearings; and donate time and resources to non-profits focused on housing access and improvement. Together, we can create a powerful voice for change.

## Wednesday Dinners

Chapter 2 in the Book of Acts reports how the early followers of Jesus spent their time after the coming of the Holy Spirit. It describes a time of awe and wonder. It describes a time of service and sharing. It describes a time when every day people prayed, worshipped, and shared meals "with glad and generous hearts." It was good and faith expanded in numbers and depth.

Eating together is a wonderfully and radically connective endeavor. It nourishes our bodies and our souls. It connects us to each other and to God from whom all blessings flow. It is both restful and restorative, sensory and stimulating.

Starting this Easter season, you are invited to come and eat together on the Second Wednesday of each month (beginning May 10). You are encouraged to invite others to join you. The food will be ready at 5:30 p.m. and we will generally serve until about 7:30 or so. People may arrive whenever is best for them and stay as long as they like. The food will be simple, nutfree, and always include a vegetarian and glutenfree option. If you have any other dietary needs, please contact the church office so that we can honor those needs too. We are hoping to offer childcare during this People who wish to donate to help offset costs can. Most importantly, don't worry about obligations; simply come and be part of the meal.

I will generally start cooking around 4:00 in the church kitchen. I always enjoy company when I cook.

In my own life, I have experienced the power of these kinds of meals. At Yale Divinity School I hosted weekly Tuesday Night Dinners open to the whole community and was delighted to see dozens of people pack my tiny apartment to enjoy simple food and good company. Jon and I still revel in memories of the Manse Dinners. Each time I have seen new connections made and joy springing forth.



About the artists:

**Peter Seidenberg,** cellist-- "Totally enchanting, inspired performances, brimming with natural, spontaneous musicianship", raves Gramophone Magazine about cellist Peter Seidenberg. Mr. Seidenberg has played in major halls throughout the US, Europe, and Asia. He made his solo debut with the Chicago Symphony, and has since appeared as soloist with many orchestras including Century Orchestra of Osaka, New American Chamber Orchestra, De Paul Chamber Orchestra, New York Chamber Soloists, and the Eastman-Rochester Philharmonic.

Hui-Mei Lin, pianist, is a native of Taiwan. She made her New York solo debut at the Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall as the winner of the Artists International Competition. She was described by the New York Times as "an excellent pianist throughout" and the Taiwan News as "a sensitive and powerful pianist." Concert tours have taken her to Italy, France, Canada, Taiwan, and various cities throughout the United States. Her media broadcast includes solo performances at PBS (Maryland), WQXR (New York City), Taiwan Television and China Broadcasting Company.
