THE GIFT OF THE WORD

SCRIPTURE READING

Matthew 14:13-21

Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, 'This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves.' Jesus said to them, 'They need not go away; you give them something to eat.' They replied, 'We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish.' And he said, 'Bring them here to me.' Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. As I began to imagine how I wanted to arrange one of my favorite spirituals, *Sometimes I feel like a Motherless Child;* I thought about how much suffering bore this beautiful and haunting melody. I chose to draw on my professional acting training and work experience which teaches us to use our own personal experiences to slip inside a character. Using two compositional techniques I worked to bring out the pain and suffering of an enslaved person as I imagined it through my own childhood story. Having witnessed and felt the tremendous and enduring struggle my mother went through when I was young, this felt like it might work. You will hear that I used a predominance of dissonant clustering chords throughout, hoping to still bring out the beauty of the melody. The second technique I used was a series of accents (stressed notes) to try and bring out the suffering and intense physical labor the enslaved people endured. If you are not adverse towards dissonance, you may enjoy this setting.
