At that place he came to a cave, and spent the night there. Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?' He answered, 'I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away.'

He said, 'Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by.' Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then there came a voice to him that said, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?'

Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. And early in the morning he came walking towards them on the lake. But when the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified, saying, 'It is a ghost!' And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid.'

Peter answered him, 'Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water.' He said, 'Come.' So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came towards Jesus. Using four biblical locations important to the story, the American hymnwriter Louis F. Benson has summarized the life of Jesus and related it to the present. Benson edited several Presbyterian hymnals and wrote a number of books on hymnody.

The banner in the choir loft was designed for a 1992 event here at the church, sponsored by Berkshire Institute of Theology and the Arts. That summer Yo-Yo Ma was performing the six Bach Cello Suites at Tanglewood. He joined theologian Jaroslav Pelikan here for a conversation on Bach's spirituality, punctuated with excerpts from the Cello Suites. The banner is many layers of nylon tulle, backed by sheer silk. I listened to the many-layered voices of Bach cantatas while configuring the abstract imagery to visually mimic the steady bass notes, the interwoven fugue motifs and the lightness of joyful, overlapping melodies. \sim Terry Wise

Music Notes ~ David Anderegg

Our musical selections today are a nod to the African-American gospel groups of the 1940s and 50s. These hugely popular groups, including the Swan Silvertones, the Pilgrim Travelers, and the Patterson Singers, traveled the African-American gospel circuit and recorded widely. They also influenced later singers who crossed over to pop music, including Ray Charles and Lou Rawls (who sang for a time with the Pilgrim Travelers).

The setting of "Give Me Jesus" is our transcription of Charles Ives' setting for voice and piano. Most Ives compositions are jangling and polytonal; this one is simple and straightforward. It is said that Ives heard it sung a cappella by an African-American domestic worker and wrote it down on the spot. It is the last song he ever put to paper.

"When My Spirit is Faint" is an unabridged version of Psalm 142 that bears the superscription "A Maskil of David. When he was in the cave." Our old friend Max Stackhouse explained the term "maskil" in this case as a poem that starts in fearful supplication ("no man cares for me") and ends in confident faith ("the righteous will surround me.")

We began singing together 20 years ago. Our first public outing was at the Stockbridge Memorial Day celebration, and our second was here on June 29, 2003. On that day, we sang "Love Lifted Me," as we do today. Over the years we have sung for lots of Sunday worship services, Easter sunrises, weddings, and funerals here; we also gave the world premieres of our operas, *What Owls Do* and *The Beasts Here*. We are so grateful for the warm embrace we have received from this congregation over two decades.
