

September 2023 Newsletter

Dear Church Family,

Wow – what a full summer. I hope that you have enjoyed this blessing and the myriad of opportunities to find truth, beauty, peace, and hope (including all we have shared here at #4 Main Street). I certainly have – it has been rich and good.

I also have to say that I am excited about the new program year that is due to arrive on our doorstep shortly starting with Rally Day on September 10. There is a way of coming back together that feels strengthening. There is an energy in all of the programs that feels rejuvenating. There is a sense of a new beginning that never fails to arrive with new hope too.

This year, though, I am particularly excited. This year, we will be jumping into the story of the Bible and experience its sweep from creation to the early days of the church.

For the last ten years, we have followed the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL) to get the readings for worship on Sunday. The RCL is wonderful – each week assigning four different readings from different parts of the Bible. The RCL does not hold back from challenging readings and it often groups readings together from week to week to explore particular stories more deeply. Over the course of the three years, the RCL helps to ensure that we have the chance to explore the breadth of the stories, theology, and history of our faith.

This year we will use the Narrative Lectionary. It provides a single reading for each week. It lays out the year to bring us into the sweep of the larger story. From the story of Creation on Rally Sunday we will go through Hebrew Scripture in the Fall joining our own lives to the formation and history of the people of faith. In Advent we will hear the prophetic call heralding the arrival of the Messiah. In Epiphany we see that revelation through the lens of the stories of Christ leading naturally through Lent and Easter at which point we join the story of the early days of the church. Over the course of this one year, we are swept through this story that we might not just learn it but find our own place in it.

In addition to the sweep of the story there are other benefits. The same story we are exploring in the Sanctuary will be the one brought to life with our children in the classroom. The ability to plan ahead for Music and special events will be much easier and more effective as we already know every reading for the year. We will in the coming year, choose a reading on some Sundays to fit our particular needs or program (like we do now), but all facets of church – worship, service, music, learning, fellowship, and even those who guide our buildings and grounds will know where we are heading and can link in as desired and helpful.

This approach will also beautifully dovetail with something else I am thrilled about – a comprehensive year-long Bible study. Nothing is quite like reading the Bible in its narrative arc and doing so with other people. We will be using a new curriculum this year through Kerygma that does go from Genesis to Revelation utilizing key passages (and hence manageable reading loads) while still conveying the fullness of the story. These full studies are pure magic in how they connect each of us to the Bible and each other. They are less about becoming experts and more about seeing the connections, engaging the story, and discovering new things. More about the two different ways I hope to lead such an undertaking can be found on page 5.

I hope you have enjoyed the summer – I hope you are as excited as I am about the possibilities here at #4 Main Street to dive into the amazing story of our faith together. Come and see!




Comprehensive Bible Study ~ led by Pastor Brent

There is simply nothing quite like reading and considering the full Bible together. There is wonder in discovering new details or meaning in stories we thought we knew so well. There are connections between the stories that are suddenly illuminated either in ways we hadn't noticed or because our life situation now helps us to see them. There is the gift of struggling with challenging passages – even those that have caused hurt or pain. There is the beauty of hearing others' perspectives that help shape our own. There is the whole arc of it that puts the life and teachings of Jesus in context. There is, of course, the kind of relationships that develop when you spend intentional and thoughtful time with others pursuing something good.

This year, I am delighted to lead a new curriculum "**Kerygma: Discovering the Bible** (A New Generation)." There are thirty lessons to this study, and it is laid out to take us from Genesis to Revelation. Thus far, I have found the study guide to be thoughtful and thought provoking. It provides enough information to stimulate good exploration without bogging the user down in too much detail. The reading load

usually includes about seven fairly short readings easily spread out through the week (ideal) or handled more intensely if needed. There are good questions and activities that not only get at what the material is all about, but why it matters for



us today. There is a copy of the Curriculum in the small conference room on the table. Feel free to take a look (and please leave it for others to do the same).

Beyond the curriculum, participants are encouraged to have a study Bible for their use. I am happy to help you pick one out that suits you. While we invite people to cover the costs of the workbook (\$35) and Bible (if needed), the church never wants study to be a financial burden, so it is never a requirement.

I plan to offer this study in two different ways:

Hybrid Mid-Day – Begins Wednesday,

September 20, planned for Wednesdays 11:45am until 1:00pm (*alternatively*, *it could be done on another weekday*)

Gathered in person and on-line, this approach will tackle one section weekly. We will engage the lesson while also building relationships with each other.

Evening In Person-In Depth – Begins Wednesday, September 27, planned for the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of the month 5:45-7:45

This approach will tackle two sections every other week. Given the length and the in-person dimension, we will allow the conversation to lead us deeply into those places of mutual interest. On

the second Wednesdays we will start by grabbing some food at the community supper; on fourth Wednesdays we will figure out whether and how to add some food into our gathering.

Given the nature of this study, it is important for people to make a commitment to being present when possible. Obviously, most people will not be able attend all the sessions, but we hope this will be a priority for the people who sign up. Please contact Pastor Brent with any questions, fears, hopes, or dilemmas.

Become a Storyteller!

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"Wholehearted Faith" Book Study

Last year's small group studies of Rachel Held Evans book "Inspired" led to many rich discussions and new perspectives on stories in the Bible. Her writing style is very accessible and she shares reflections on her faith with honesty, humor and humility. She died tragically at the early age of 37. The book "Wholehearted Faith" was completed by her colleague Jeff Chu and was published posthumously.

This year, the Christian Education Committee invites you to join us as we read Evans' final book, *Wholehearted Faith*. We are offering three to four small group sessions that will meet monthly beginning in late September and ending in April. Our hope is that meeting monthly will not only afford the opportunity for wonderful discussions but also that it will give us time for reflection and action as we strive to live in Wholehearted Faith. Each meeting will be an hour and a half.

We plan to offer this study in three different ways, all beginning in late September:

- Sunday Morning In-Person, starts Sept 24 (not on Choir Sundays) 8:30 9:50am
- Morning Hybrid –Mondays 9:00-10:30am, starts Sept 25. Gathered in person and on-line.

We are delighted to announce that Maggie Bennett, who is visiting her homeland from the Stockbridge Munsee Community in Wisconsin, will be speaking with us after church on September 24. Maggie uses storymapping, a technique which bridges geographic information systems, photography, history, and archaeology, to tell the story of the travels of the Stockbridge-Munsee people. Please join us in welcoming her as we learn more about the descendants of the first members of this church.

Because of Maggie's visit, we will be rescheduling Josh Hall's history presentation (originally scheduled for September 17) to a date later this fall. Watch for details about the new date.

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We are continuing our work towards a land acknowledgment and appropriate accompanying action. Please check the Justice page on the church website for important resources about the Stockbridge-Munsee Community and the land acknowledgment process.

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The Stockbridge-Munsee Community, the indigenous peoples of the Berkshires, opened an exhibit at the Mission House in Stockbridge, MA this spring. This exhibit is titled "Our Lands, Our Home, Our Heart / Nda'keenã , Weekeyaak , Nda'anã" and goes over Mohican history and culture, particularly in the town of Stockbridge and their many travels to their current reservation lands in Wisconsin.

As part of this exhibit, there is a five-person speaker series that will begin on September 23



This series brings members of the Tribe out to Stockbridge, MA to speak on issues relevant to the Mohican community of today. On Saturday, September 30 at 7:30 pm, there will be a Soprano Riot in our sanctuary!
