

In November one Liturgical Year comes to a close so that another may start. In November we offer a special worship service AND a Thanksgiving mid-day dinner on Thanksgiving so that we can be fed spiritually AND literally. In November I have come to learn here in the Berkshires we slow down from all of the summer activities, and we come back together to share both our stories from those adventures AND the hopes we have for the days to come.

I love November! This year I can't wait to look backward. This year I can't wait to look forward. This year, most of all, I can't wait to live in the moment and to do so together.

#### A Moment for Stewardship



My name is
Elisabeth
Bellows and I am
one of the newest
members of this
congregation. As
a new member, I
am hoping that
your
congregation's
"story" will
influence me and
I am also hoping
that my life story
will impact the

congregation, particularly over the years to come. So here is a brief introduction to my story.

I grew up in New England in an academic family. Upon graduating from medical school, I moved out to California to have that quintessential California experience. I raised two sons with my husband Vince, and I attended the local UCC church for 10 years. Upon retirement, I found myself longing for New England and small-town community. So my husband and I moved to Stockbridge and I joined FCC just over 12 months ago.

One thing that I can say, right up front, is that I am hungry for community. I hunger for an intergenerational community. A place to talk about faith and spirituality and all those big topics that fascinate me. A community that is serious about music. A community that provides support in times of trouble. A liberal, progressive, dogood community. A community that brings great casseroles to potluck events.

Do you notice anything here? The First Congregational Church checks ALL of the boxes on my ideal community description! What other gathering would provide all these things that I want? FCC is a one-stop shop for me. I don't need to join any other clubs! So when I pledge money to FCC, I am giving to a community that I care about. And in keeping my church community financially healthy, I am taking care of myself and my neighbor.

There is another part of this annual pledge that is more difficult to talk about. It's the God thing. You know, I don't pray with any regularity. And I only read the Bible in preparation for Bible study classes. But it's very clear to me that my spiritual development involves participating in a lot of church programs. But I think that pledging is ALSO a spiritual activity. A kind of communication between me and God. Pledging reminds me to align my financial priorities with God's plan. That's all for this month!



#### The Brothertown Indian Nation

On October 12, The First Congregational Church, welcomed members of the Brothertown Indian Nation. They were in Stockbridge to tour the library, burial grounds and Mission House as part of a week-long journey to their homelands. Will Garrison, Charlotte Rodgers and Niti Martin greeted them and a light lunch was enjoyed by all as shared stories about the Justice Task Force and the history of FCC. The group presented us with

a hand carved shell and other mementos of our time together.

The Brothertown Indian Nation is rooted in early and pre-colonial times, and members of the current community are made up of the descendants of Mohegan, Eastern Pequot, Mashantucket

Pequot, Niantic, Narragansett, Montauk and Tunxis peoples that come to practice Christianity. They moved west to New York, and later, Wisconsin, where they live today. Unlike the Stockbridge Munsee Mohican Community, the Brothertown Nation is not a federally recognized Indian Tribe.

It was wonderful opportunity to share

information, and learn more of the history of this group. We learned that a key leader was Samson Occom, a Christian minister who devoted his life to spreading Christianity to indigenous people. Occom was part of a movement to move Christian indigenous people west – in the hope of giving them greater opportunity for owning land and leading a better life.

#### **Justice Task Force**

On September 24, the Justice Task Force was delighted to host Maggie Bennett, a member the Stockbridge-Munsee Community, who was visiting from Wisconsin. Maggie uses story mapping, a technique which bridges geographic information systems, photography, history, and archaeology, to tell the story of the Stockbridge-Munsee people. She discussed the travels of the community and the importance of Christianity in her culture.

### Rally Day - The Story Continues Seed Spitting!

A monthly Walking Pilgrimage

The date for the first walking pilgrimage would be Wednesday, November 8, 2023 at 5:00pm (then every second Wednesday).

#### Structure and Goals:

- A. Through a once-monthly walking pilgrimage, church members will be encouraged to acknowledge the power of direct relationship with God in the Wilderness of Stockbridge's walking paths.
- B. Through fellowship, spiritual/religious context paired to the liturgical season, direct interaction with the natural world via 45-60 minutes walks, prayer and stated intention at the beginning and ending of each walk, participants will be supported to deepen their relationship with their faith, their church, and themselves.
- C. Once monthly walks offer an embodied connection to stated intention, foci, and teachings.
- D. A church sponsored Covid-safe alternative for connecting with others
