Music Notes ~ Peter Frost

John Fawcett (1739-1817) wrote the words to "Blest Be the Tie that Binds" in 1782. This hymn has become one of the most popular closing hymns of all time. Fawcett served a rural church in Wainsgate, England. Albert Bailey, a hymnologist described Fawcett's parish as a "a straggling group of houses on the top of a barren hill." This was probably an apt description of many rural parishes at the time. Bailey also describes the congregation as follows: "The people were all farmers and shepherds, poor as Job's turkey; an uncouth lot whose speech one could hardly understand, unable to read or write; most of them pagans cursed with vice and ignorance and wild tempers."
