
Land Acknowledgement

This summer I invite you to experience sabbath.

This summer we are planning for worship that is simple, honest, and inviting. While the organ is

being restored our music will explore the beauty of piano and melodies that are inviting and joyful. We are currently planning events that invite people to be together without a great deal of planning or preparation.

We work hard as a church. We accomplish so much. This summer my hope for us is not to take the summer off as a church, but to focus on those aspects of faith that are generative, life-giving,



enjoyable, and restorative. This summer I want to see you and have the chance to simply be together in meaningful ways.

In many ways I am inviting us into an extended Sabbath. The Commandment to "Remember" the Sabbath is the fourth

ACTIVE PRAYERS OF THANKSGIVING

On May 5, our church revived the practice of an Active Prayer of Thanksgiving as an act of gratitude after receiving communion. We

encouraged the congregation to bring non-perishable food items and/or money for food, to be given to a local food pantry. We had a procession to the front of the sanctuary (that's the active part!) to bring our donations (that's the thankful response part!). In May, our donations went to the People's Pantry in



Great Barrington. The congregation's enthusiastic response produced four large bins of food and approximately \$324.00 in monetary donations. Thank you!

On June 2, the Active Prayer of Thanksgiving will go to our congregation's Pop Up Pantry.

We encourage donations of food and/or money for Mission & Action's grocery runs. Food items needed: Nut-free butters (such as Sun Butter), gluten free items (cereal, pasta,

> mac & cheese, crackers), box milk, canned items (fruit, veggies, beans, soup, tuna, chicken, diced tomatoes), box cereal, oatmeal (drums or boxes of packets), peanut butter, box rice, pasta, mac & cheese, crackers, toiletries (toothbrush, toothpaste, bar soap, lotion). And "extra" items are always appreciated: drinks, condiments, cookies, etc.

We look forward to responding to Christ's offering of spiritual food at communion by giving generously to our neighbors' need for physical nourishment. As you do this for the members of God's family who have food insecurity, Jesus tells us "that was me – you did it for me."

CATHEDRAL OF THE BELOVED

On April 28th, we were graced with beautiful spring weather—a perfect accompaniment to the meal our church team served at Cathedral of the Beloved (COTB) in Pittsfield. Worship and lunch were held on the front lawn of St. Joseph Catholic Church on North St. Every week, yearround, COTB hosts an informal worship service followed by a meal. It offers a special welcome to those who are homeless or disadvantaged.

What is worship like at COTB? Folks arrive from all directions—some on foot, some in wheelchairs, some pushing strollers. The coffee station is often the first stop for the attendees. They particularly rejoiced over the half & half on the coffee table that day! Sitting or standing on the lawn, some of us joined with those worshipping. After music and a message, a question was posed to the group: "Why are you still here today?" Heartfelt tears and statements of gratitude poured forth from those who have, by some standards, seemingly little.

After the service, it was time for more sustenance . . . this time in the form of food! The menu consisted of beef stew (8 large crockpots' worth), dinner rolls generously donated by Berkshire Mountain Bakery, salad, cookies, and water. Under the fine leadership of Martha Floyd, the team included shoppers on Friday, food prep crew on Saturday, and eight servers on Sunday. Many thanks to Martha & Rick Floyd, seven members of West Stockbridge Church, Beth Cilley, Terry Wise, Carl Bradford, Marion Pomeroy, Vicky Cooper, Tracy Wilson, and Cindy & Jack Brown.

We will be volunteering for this ministry again later in 2024. We hope you'll join us! As Rick Floyd so simply and poignantly summarized, "This is church."

Pride Month: Worship, Parade, and Community Conversations




